Disability Activism in Europe: Documentary Film Exploring Young Disabled People's Views and Experiences

Invitation paragraph

You are being invited to take part in a research project. Before you decide it is important for you to understand why the research is being done and what it will involve. Please take time to review the following information carefully and discuss it with others if you wish. Please contact the researcher, Miro Griffiths (details at the end of this document) if there is anything that is not clear or if you would like more information. Take time to decide whether or not you wish to take part.

What is the purpose of the project?

This project aims to explore young disabled people's experiences of disability activism and disability politics across Europe. The project will explore the opportunities and challenges encountered by young disabled people as they participate in disability activism across Europe, and the importance of disabled people's social movements.

Why have I been chosen?

In order to participate in the documentary film recorded interview, you will need to confirm the following:

- your age is within the range of 18 to 35;
- you identify as a disabled person;
- you have experience/are interested in disability activism and disability politics;
- you live currently in a European country.

Do I have to take part?

It is up to you to decide whether or not to take part. If you decide to take part, please download and keep a copy of the information sheet, consent form, and documentary film release form. Your participation in this study is voluntary entirely and you can withdraw at any time and without explanation. During the initial meeting and recorded interview, you do not have to answer any questions you do not want to and you can insist that the interview stops at any time and do not need to give a reason. If you want to withdraw part or all of your data after completing the recorded interview, please email Miro Griffiths and outline what you would like removed. Please note: you will need to contact Miro Griffiths with a data withdrawal request within one month after completing the interview.

What do I have to do?/ What will happen to me if I take part?

There are two parts. Firstly, you can take part in an online meeting, at a time and date of your choosing. The meeting will last approximately 30 minutes and can be conducted on your preferred video conferencing platform (e.g., Teams, Zoom, Google Meet, etc.). The

meeting will need to be conducted in English. During the meeting, we can discuss your experiences and views of disability activism and I can answer any questions about the documentary film. After the meeting, Miro Griffiths will contact you within two weeks to inform you if you have been selected for a recorded interview. Unfortunately, Miro Griffiths is unable to do recorded interviews with everybody who indicates interest. This is due to budget and time constraints.

The online meeting will take place through a video conferencing platform (e.g. Microsoft Teams, Zoom, or Google Meet). You can choose your preferred video platform and Miro Griffiths will set up the meeting. Once you have selected your preferred video platform, Miro Griffiths will send you data processing and management information for your selected platform. This is so you understand how your data is processed by your selected platform.

You will need an Internet connection on a computer, laptop, mobile phone, or tablet to take part in the online meeting. The interview will be conducted in English.

During the online meeting, you will be asked questions about your personal experiences of disability activism and social movements, as well as your opinion on improving participation within European disabled people's social movements. Some of the questions will have follow up questions, which is an opportunity for me to find out more information. At the end of the online meeting, you will have the option to ask any questions and provide any further information. You can also contact Miro Griffiths at any point after the interview.

If you are selected to take part in a recorded interview for the documentary film, and you still want to do this, then Miro Griffiths will discuss the available options to conduct the recorded interview. This may be online or face-to-face, depending on your preference and access requirements. Miro Griffiths will interview you and the recording camera will be operated by a disabled filmmaker, Paul Darke. The recorded interview may appear in the final version of the documentary film, but this will be decided at the documentary film editing phase.

It will take, approximately, 30 minutes to complete the recorded interview. You will only need to take part in the recorded interview once, unless you would like an additional meeting to provide more information. You will be asked similar questions to those asked during the online meeting.

What are the possible disadvantages and risks of taking part?

The interview will ask questions about accessibility and participation within activist networks and social movements. Reflecting on experiences of barriers is a sensitive topic, it may cause some discomfort and/or upset. Miro Griffiths will be available to talk through any concerns. We will also support you to find appropriate support organisations in your country.

What are the possible benefits of taking part?

Whilst there are no immediate benefits for those people participating in the interviews, it is hoped that this work will provide an original and important exploration of young disabled people's experiences of disability activism across Europe.

Use, dissemination and storage of research data and personal information

The online meeting will not include any recorded data other than typed notes on a computer document, which will be saved on a University of Leeds password protected cloud storage platform.

The recorded interview data will be stored on a University of Leeds password protected cloud storage. The data stored on Miro Griffiths' University of Leeds storage drives will be deleted by October 2028. This will be five years after the research has concluded.

Parts of your recorded interview will be combined with the responses from other participants. Paul Darke will then work with Miro Griffiths to edit and produce a documentary film. You will be given a copy of the documentary film if you want one. The documentary film will then be used for subsequent research, education, and raising awareness about disability activism.

You can decide if you would like to have your real identity included in the documentary film. This means people who access the documentary film will be aware of your name. If you do not want your identity included in the documentary film, then all attempts will be made to remove personal data and direct identifiers. You will be asked – prior to and after the recorded interview – if you want your identity revealed in the documentary film. You can also contact Miro Griffiths after the recorded interview if you change your decision; you will need to do this within one month of the recorded interview.

Your recorded interview will be combined with the responses from other participants and then analysed by Miro Griffiths. If you do not want your name linked with the documentary film, then all personal identifiers will not be included in the analysis or subsequent publications linked to the research. This means Miro Griffiths will keep your personal data confidential and will take all available measures to ensure you are not identified in the research. Description and summaries of all the data collected will be used in future publications, such as conference papers, journal articles, and books. The research will also be stored in the University of Leeds research data repository, which will help other researchers exploring similar topics. Who is organising/ funding the research?

Miro Griffiths is a paid employee of the University of Leeds. The Leverhulme Trust has partially funded Miro to carry out this research, and contributed towards research expenses.
